EYE DROPS:

In the eye that had surgery, please use the following eye drops. **Wait 3 minutes** between each drop. You may receive a generic substitute for these drops.

•	Right Eye	Ofloxacin	use FOUR	times	daily
•	Left eye	Prednisolone	use FOUR	times	daily

During the normal postoperative period:

- Your eye may be dilated
- Your eyes may tire easily
- Your vision may be blurry
- You may feel like there's something in your eye
 You may have blood in your tears
- Your eye may be red and swollen
- Your eye may ache and/or throb

- Your eyes may be sensitive to light
- Your eyes may tear and run
- Your nose may run
- Your face and eyelids may become swollen
- You may have a headache

Instructions to follow after surgery:

- Position your head as follows
- Avoid rubbing or bumping your eye.
- Avoid heavy lifting and strenuous activities. Do not swim.
- Continue your usual outpatient medications.
- You may use ibuprofen and/or tylenol, if needed, to control the pain.
- Using a clean wet washcloth, gently clean all matter away from your eyelids each morning.
- You may shower or bathe, but you should protect the eye from soap and other irritants.
- You may use a cool compress or an ice pack to help reduce discomfort and swelling.
- You may find that dark glasses make your eyes more comfortable.
- Reading, watching TV, or other visual activity will not harm your eye.
- Call the office if you have increasing pain or decreasing vision.

If an air or gas bubble was placed in your eye:

- **Do NOT** remove the gas bubble warning bracelet until you are told to so do by the doctor.
- **Do NOT** fly in an airplane until the bubble is completely gone.
- **Do NOT** dive under water until the bubble is completely gone.
- **Do NOT** change altitude significantly until the bubble is completely gone.
- **Do NOT** have nitrous oxide (laughing gas) anesthetic until the bubble is gone.
- **Do NOT** have treatments in a hyperbaric chamber until the bubble is gone.
- Your vision will be poor at least until the bubble is completely gone, possibly longer.
